Tynsel Parkes C.E. Primary Academy is committed to educating the whole child in a caring community and PSHE & RSE & HE plays an important part in these aims. At Tynsel Parkes Church of England Primary Academy, our vision is for everyone to feel valued and be all they can be whilst embracing Christian values in our daily lives.

We aim to provide high quality learning that challenges and inspires, whilst embracing Christian Values in our daily lives. Our PSHE and RSE & HE curriculum is designed not only to fulfil statutory requirements but to enthuse **all** children with a love of learning. This will be achieved through a mixture of; exploration, discovery, creativity and a variety of learning opportunities that broaden children's knowledge and understanding. Children will develop enquiring minds and a love of learning encapsulating the school motto 'Loving and Learning together'.

This policy is overarched and subject to the agreed contents and conditions of the Safeguarding Children and E- Safety Policies

This policy sets out the approach of Tynsel Parkes Primary Academy to Relationships and Sex Education and Health Education (RSHE) and Personal, Social and Health Education. (PSHE).

Legal context

The Children and Social Work Act 2017 made it statutory for Primary schools to teach Relationships Education and Health Education and for Secondary schools to teach Relationships and Sex Education and Health Education from September 2020. Following this change to the law the Department for Education published Statutory Guidance for Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex Education (RSE) and Health Education (2019) which includes the legal requirement for Primary schools to have a Relationships Education policy and Secondary schools to have a Relationships and Sex Education policy. A Health Education Policy is not statutory but is recognised as good practice and is included here.

Definition

RSHE supports children and young peoples' personal development including their spiritual, moral, social and cultural development. It aims to help them to deal with the real-life issues that they face as they grow up and that they will encounter as adults. Their learning will support them to make informed choices both on and off-line about their safety, physical and mental health enabling, them to live positive and fulfilled lives.

RSHE is enhanced by a supportive school ethos where all are valued, positive relationships are promoted and there is a safe learning environment.

PSHE education is a planned and progressive programme of learning through which children and young people acquire the knowledge, understanding and skills they need to manage their lives and contribute positively to society, now and in the future. As part of a whole school approach, PSHE education teaches pupils about the qualities and

attributes they need to thrive as individuals, family members and members of the local community and wider society.

Aims

The RSHE & PSHE programme aims to: -

- Provide accurate, age appropriate information to all children.
- Support the development of knowledge, skills and attitudes to enable children to make informed choices.
- Build confidence and self-esteem.
- Develop personal attributes and prepare children as they develop and become adults.
- Develop positive and inclusive attitudes to everyone, particularly to those with protected characteristics under the Equality Act 2010.
- To develop and embrace the Christian values of our school in our daily lives.

Roles and responsibilities

An effective programme of RSHE/PSHE requires support from the whole school community, the following role and responsibilities have been identified.

Trustees

- Oversee strategies and procedures across the Trust.
- Ensure that Church Schools in the Trust follow relevant guidance and policy provided by the Church of England (CoE).

Principal

- Oversee the development and delivery of RSHE/PSHE in the Academy including supporting the subject leader.
- Give staff the opportunity to contribute to the development of RSHE.
- Facilitate training for the subject leader and staff as required.
- Support the subject leader's work with parents/carers so that they are kept informed of current content and delivery of the RSHE/PSHE curriculum.
- In church schools, ensure that relevant CoE guidance and policy is followed.

Subject Leader

- Lead the development and delivery of effective RSHE/PSHE across the Academy.

- Keep up to date with latest developments in the subject.
- Support staff as necessary.
- Monitor and evaluate RSHE/PSHE throughout the year and report to the Academy Principal.
- Liaise with parents and carers as necessary to keep information on the subject content and delivery up to date.
- In church schools, ensure that relevant CoE guidance and policy is followed.

All staff

- Know and implement the policy relating to RSHE/PSHE.
- Teach RSHE/PSHE using the agreed academy curriculum.
- Maintain positive and supportive links with parents and carers.
- Respond to the needs and questions of children, young people and their families regarding the content and delivery of the RSHE/PSHE curriculum.
- Monitor progress throughout the academic year.

Parents/Carers

- Will be encouraged to engage with staff to better understand the content and delivery of the RSHE/PSHE curriculum.
- Will be kept up to date of any changes and/or additions to the RSHE curriculum.
- Will be informed of their right to withdraw their children from sex education lessons when these are scheduled all content will be age appropriate.
- In church schools, they will be assured that relevant CoE guidance and policy is followed.

Teaching and Learning

At Tynsel Parkes RSHE/PSHE will be taught through designated weekly lessons and classroom worship sessions. Where cross curricular links are encouraged and developed .The lessons will incorporate all the School and Christian values. They may be delivered in a variety of ways through the wider context of the school in class discussions, assemblies and visitors to the academy.

The differentiated lessons will provide the opportunity for children develop their knowledge, skills, attitudes and revisit topics when necessary.

Our staff are confident and skilled to enable them to deliver effective RSHE /PSHE lessons particularly where sensitive or controversial issues are included. The Principal and Subject Leader will assess the professional development needs of staff and provide training if needed. Using internal or external expertise when required.

Resources

At Tynsel Parkes, we will be following the Entrust schemes of work, accompanied by an additional range of carefully selected resources such as Picture News. These will be kept up to date and used to support teaching and learning in RSHE/PSHE.

Equality

The Equality Act sets out the duty to eliminate discrimination, advance equality of opportunity and foster good relationships between those with protected characteristics and those without. The protected characteristics are:

- Age
- Marriage and Civil partnership
- Disability
- Race
- Religion & belief
- Sexual orientation
- Sex
- Pregnancy and maternity
- Gender reassignment

In addition, we will also consider the needs of our pupils with Special Educational Needs (SEN). The RSHE/PSHE programme will meet the needs of all children. Lessons will include content which will tackle discrimination and foster good relationships.

Right to withdraw

Parents and carers cannot legally withdraw their child from any aspect of Relationships Education or Health Education.

Parents and carers have the right to withdraw from Sex Education apart from content that is taught within the Science National Curriculum.

At Tynsel Parkes the implications of withdrawing a child from these lessons will be explained to parents and carers. If the parent/carer still wishes to exercise their right to withdraw the Academy will provide

suitable alternative learning activities at the time the lessons are taking place.

The parent and carer right to withdraw applies up to three terms before the young person turns 16. After that point if the young person wishes to receive sex education the Academy will make the appropriate arrangements.

Tynsel Parkes teachers will inform parents/carers when sex education lessons will take place and remind them of their right to withdraw. Parents and carers must inform the academy of their intention to withdraw their child.

Safeguarding

RSHE/PSHE include sensitive topics and it is therefore possible that discussions will prompt safeguarding disclosures. Reference should be made to SUAT safeguarding policies and procedures to deal with any disclosures appropriately and sensitively.

Class teachers should discuss with the Designated Safeguarding Lead (R Chandler) any potentially sensitive topics. Appropriate steps will be taken to provide additional support for children if required.

Staff should consider the timing of lessons to ensure that children have the opportunity to report any concerns they may have either that day or the following day.

Monitoring and evaluating

The Principal and Subject Leader will monitor and evaluate RSHE/PSHE in line with other subjects in the Academy. This will include, lesson observations, learning walks, evidence of learning, and feedback from staff, parents/carers and children. Pupils' progress will be recorded in line with other areas of the curriculum on the Insight Tracking system.
